



Allocasuarina verticillata

Coast She-oak, Drooping She-oak

Height:

4m - 11m

Width:

3m - 6m

Habit:

Small erect tree with a dense rounded crown, though can appear sparse when young.

Foliage:

Drooping greyish-green branchlets.

Flowers:

Yellow to brown male flower spikes from March to December. Barrel-shaped cones.

Requirements:

Well drained soils. Tolerates a variety of sites and soil conditions. Full sun.

Cultivation & uses:

Slow to moderate growing tree with attractive drooping branches. Suitable for use as a windbreak or shade tree. Hard and fissured dark bark. The Drooping She-oak has been used extensively on difficult and exposed sites due to its resistance to frost, drought and wind.

Local Distribution:

Map is indicative to the natural distribution of the species based on the best available knowledge.

The natural occurrence of this species is rare.

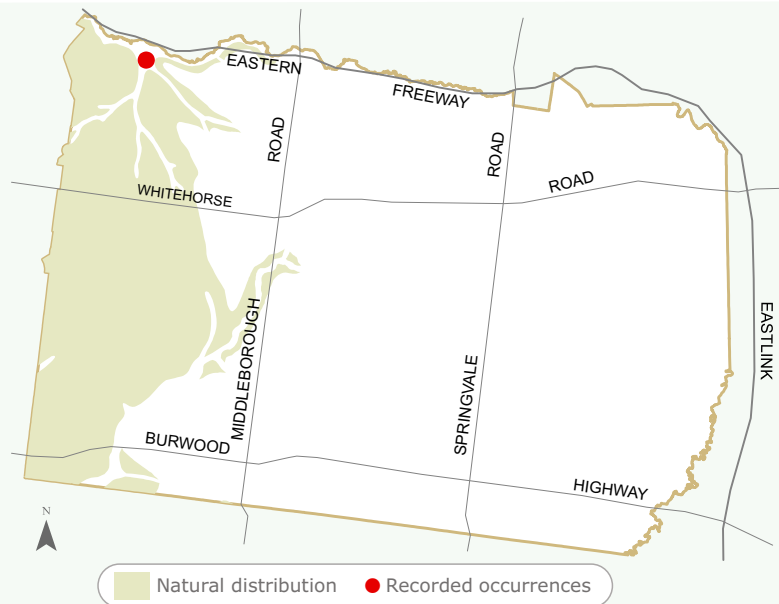
