



Eucalyptus camaldulensis

River Red Gum

Height:	12m - 40m
Width:	15m - 35m
Habit:	Medium to tall open spreading tree. Smooth and mottled bark, shedding during late summer/autumn to show white, yellow and grey, becoming rough around the base.
Foliage:	Juvenile leaves - bluish-green, broad and lance-shaped to 26cm x 8cm. Adult leaves - dull, narrow and lance-shaped to 25cm x 2cm.
Flowers:	Clusters of buds with pointy caps and profuse white to cream flowers from November to March.
Requirements:	Adaptable to a wide range of soils, but prefers soils with an assured supply of water. Tolerates very dry periods and inundation once established. Full sun.
Cultivation & uses:	One of the most widespread eucalypt in Australia, commonly found along inland watercourses and floodplains. Excellent for planting in parklands and large gardens. Useful as a shade tree or to combat salinity. An important food source for koalas.

Local Distribution:

Map is indicative to the natural distribution of the species based on the best available knowledge.

The natural occurrence of this species is infrequent.

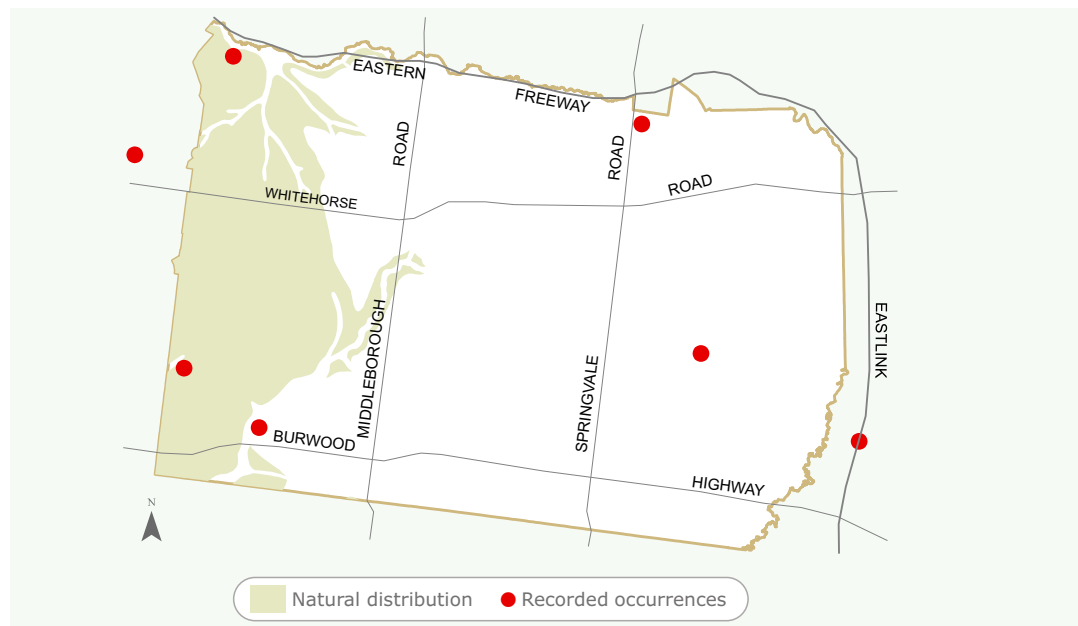
